BOARD OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES

A seven-member Board of School Trustees establishes CCSD policy and employs the superintendent to serve as chief executive officer. Trustees are elected to four-year terms. Regular meetings of the board are held on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month at 4 p.m. in the Edward A. Greer Education Center, 2832 E. Flamingo Rd. PERFORMANCE ZONES

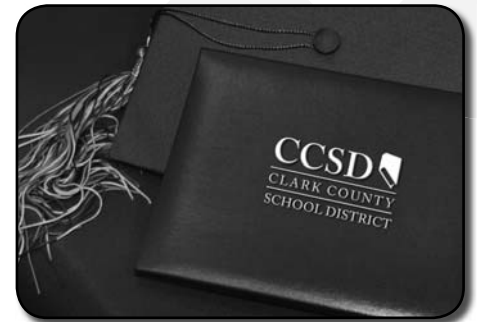
The Clark County School District is the fifth-largest school district in the United States:

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Due to changes at the state level, graduation requirements vary depending upon the student's grade level. Nevada is currently transitioning to new graduation requirements. To view requirements for each graduating class, visit ccsd.net/grad-requirements. For a standard diploma, all students must also earn 22 ½ credits in the following subjects:

- English – 4 credits
 - Math – 3 credits*
 - Science – 2 credits
 - U.S. History – 1 credit
 - U.S. Government – 1 credit
 - Physical Education – 2 credits
 - World History or Geography – 1 credit
 - Health Education – ½ credit
 - Computers – ½ credit
 - Electives – 7 ½ credits
- * Mathematics course units must include at least Algebra I or Algebra IH, or above.

Certificates of attendance are no longer issued by the Clark County School District. Students who do not earn a diploma will not be allowed to participate in graduation ceremonies.

EMPLOYEES

The district employs 40,118 people, including full-time, part-time, substitute and temporary employees:

- 18,090 licensed personnel
- 11,247 support staff (includes clerical and food service staff, bus drivers, teacher aides, custodians, etc.)
- 1,323 administrators (principals, assistant principals, deans, central office, etc.)
- 142 school police
- 4,611 substitute teachers
- 4,705 other temporary/substitute employees

BUDGET

The general fund operating budget for the 2014-15 school year is \$2.369 billion, with basic per-pupil state funding at \$5,527 and per-pupil expenditures at \$8,059.

Per-pupil expenditures include funding from federal programs, special education, and class size reduction. The district receives revenue from various sources including:

- 35.5% local sales tax
- 38.4% state funding
- 17.5% property tax funding
- 5.3% government services tax, federal support, other
- 3.3% opening fund balance



TRANSPORTATION

The Clark County School District encompasses all of Clark County, which covers 7,910 square miles and includes the metropolitan Las Vegas area and all outlying communities and rural areas.

- 1,608 buses
- 111,286 general education students were eligible for transportation while 14,272 special education students were eligible in the 2013-14 school year.
- More than 22.2 million miles traveled last school year (2013-14)

SPECIALIZED PROGRAMS

A range of programs that meet a broad spectrum of students' educational needs are available.

Accelerated

Gifted education services are provided to eligible students through a variety of programming (ccsd.net/divisions/student-support-services-division).

Adult Education

Adult education provides an opportunity for those 18 and older to obtain a high school diploma. (ccsd.net/edservices)

English as a Second Language

As allowed by state regulation, CCSD delivers all instruction in English when possible, and the child's primary language is used to clarify instruction. For more information, visit ellp.ccsd.net or call 702-799-2137.

Magnet Schools, Career and Technical Academies

Magnet Schools and Career and Technical Academies (CTAs) offer specialized programs in various career pathways.
